

4 missionary projects to give young adults a 2nd chance

Water



Water provisioning fails regularly. Rain water is collected - but the system is desolate. Project: Build a well providing enough water.


Electricity

Project: save energy, provide stable energy provisioning.


Internet



The school has only sporadic Internet availability. Reasons are manyfold.

Support elementary school education for young children left alone in the world.

Mission Environment

Pupils at Bischoftu School

About 80% of the pupils have no home; the live at the street. Neither the education center nor their private environment can offer daily meals. Much of them are day laborer. Inflation, child labor, prostitution and aids are daily life stories.

The school has capacity of 100 pupils per year. Starting 2010 225 young people finished the education - ALL of them got a permanent job.

Global Care set up an education center their for disadvantaged teenagers. The education center offers courses for needs of the local market. Currently this is cooking, waitress, electrician and woodwork. All courses include common sciences and computer skills.

The school is controlled by government officials, the young people attending are "delegated" from officials. To be allowed to go to that school the pupils need to be below a minimum income.



Corporate Social Responsibility der Audatex GmbH: Projekt Lift to Life

Zunehmend ist Corporate Social Responsibility Teil von Unternehmensstrategien mit Innen- und Außenwirkung. Die Audatex Deutschland GmbH aus Minden führt zusammen mit ihrem Mutterkonzern Solera das soziale Projekt Lift2Life durch. Dazu waren die beiden Mitarbeiter Olga Wolf in Indien und Andreas Wittig in Äthiopien.

Das Projekt wurde innerhalb des Solera-Konzerns weltweit ausgeschrieben. Jeder Mitarbeiter konnte sich mit einem sozialen Projekt seiner Wahl an einem Ort seiner Wahl bewerben. Weltweit wurden 5 Projekte ausgewählt. Andreas Wittig aus Minden hatte die Unterstützung der Global-Care Schule in Äthiopien vorgeschlagen. Dieses Projekt wurde dann auch akzeptiert.

Andreas hatte bereits privaten Kontakt zum Kinderhilfswerk Global-Care. Das KHW betreibt in Äthiopien eine Berufsschule für Jugendliche ohne jegliches Einkommen. Mit der Ausbildung in 4 verschiedenen Ausbildungsbereichen erhalten diese Jugendlichen ihre 2.te Chance auf eine Zukunft. Die Ausbildung ist 1-jährig. Seit Bestehen der Schule konnten 100% der Schüler in einen permanenten Job vermittelt werden.

Das Motto des Lift2Life-Projektes lautet "Hilfe zur Selbsthilfe" wobei besonders auf Nachhaltigkeit geachtet wird. Die Vorbereitungsphase dauerte 6 Monate. Zusammen mit Global-Care wurde der Bedarf ermittelt, Planungen durchgeführt und nicht zuletzt das erforderliche Geld organisiert. Gemäß des Solara-80/20 Prinzips stellte Solera 80% der Kosten, 20% wurden in Form von Sponsoren und Fundraisings eingeholt. Folgende Projekte wurden dann von August-Dezember 2015 in Bischoftu / Äthiopien durchgeführt:

- Elektrische Beleuchtung des Schulgeländes: Das Schulgelände lag vollkommen im Dunkeln.
 Dies war insbesondere ein hohes Sicherheitsrisiko für die Wachleute, welche die Schule 24
 Stunden bewachen. Da die Schule hochwertiges Material beherbergt ist nachts ein
 willkommenes Objekt für Diebe. Im Rahmen von Lift2Life haben wir auf dem Gelände und an
 den Gebäuden moderne LED-Lampen installiert. Dabei wurden die anwesenden Lehrer und
 Schüler integriert: sie selbst haben dies montiert und installiert.
- Wasserversorgung: In der äthiopischen Sommerzeit regnet es 6 Monate lang nicht. Die städtische Wasserversorgung ist unzureichend; regelmäßig gab es für mehrere Tage kein Wasser. In solchen Tagen musste der Unterricht abgesagt werden. Es Bestand der Wunsch eines eigenen Brunnens auf dem Schulgelände. In 90m Tiefe wurde Trinkwasser vermutet. Im Rahmen von Lift2Life haben wir entsprechende Bohrungen vorgenommen, einen Trinkwasserbrunnen installiert und die Versorgung zu den Schulgebäuden gewährleistet. Dies war das anstrengendste und langwierigste Projekt in Äthiopien. Im Ergebnis besteht nun eine ständige Wasserversorgung für Küche und Sanitäranlagen.
- Internetversorgung: Die Schule hatte eine DSL-Leitung zu einem Büro-PC im Verwaltungsbereich. Für Schüler und Lehrer stand kein Internet-Zugang zur Verfügung. Im Rahmen von Lift2Life haben wir ein Netzwerk für die gesamte Schule installiert. Im Ergebnis ist es nun möglich, dass Lehrer und Schüler (häufig zum ersten Mal in ihrem Leben) Zugang zum Internet haben.

Das Lift2Life Projekt von Andreas endetet formal im Februar 2015. Ein besonderes Anliegen ist jedoch die Nachhaltigkeit: wie geht es weiter, wenn die Unterstützer nicht mehr vor Ort sind? Während des 6 monatigen Aufenthaltes haben sich viele persönliche Beziehungen, sogar Freundschaften ergeben. So wundert es nicht, dass die Zusammenarbeit mit der Berufsschule in

Äthiopien weitergeht. So ist es geplant, dass neben der Berufsschule auch eine Grundschule für die Klassen 1-8 erstellt werden soll. Außerdem ist es erforderlich, dass die Berufsschule nach Möglichkeiten sucht "Geld zu verdienen", also Güter oder Dienstleistungen anzubieten, mit denen Geld von der Berufsschule erwirtschaftet werden kann. Die Planungen hierzu für die nächsten 2 Jahre sind aufgestellt.






20014-06-24 - Visit of Katie Harvill

2014 Jul 03 – Clarifying Electricity Details


With electrical engineers discussing details of the power supply system at Bishoftu school.

These days I met near Hannover with two electricians who will support me by setting up the technical stuff: Gerd Krüger and Klaus Ladewig. Both are experienced electricians and did work in Africa for years.

We talked about lot of interesting details. It turned out that it is not a good idea to have hot water tube collectors and photovoltaic panel in parallel. These would be two independent systems which increases maintenance effort. Setting up only solar panels is the most meaningful and long lasting approach.

Our core interest is, that the system needs to be maintainable by the people at the location, they need to set it up, understand the construction and they need to be able to get spare parts at their location.


2014 Jul 13 – Time Schedule for Ethiopia

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
2014 Jul 20 – Doc Hendley




2014 Aug 06 – Travel to Ethiopia

Left from Minden to Ethiopia on 7th Aug at noon. Everything was nicely organized, my wife wished farewell at the train station. My package was 40kg; it included about 8kg of LED lamps which I bought it advance in Germany. Though I had a really huge checklist, at the train I noticed two things I forgot: a comb and a necktie. I got the Info that for formal events the Ethiopian people care for correct dresses. Preparation at the airport and flight were without any complication. I even got my luggage back in the original condition at Addis Abeba – what a luck. At arrival I had an appointment with Aida, she is the school lead at the Bishoftu School and will accompany during my complete mission. But – Aida wasn't there. I lost my first Euro after a foreign woman asked me whether she can help me, just Ethiopian kindness. I showed her the phone number of Aida, so we had a talk at the foreign woman mobile, after this she took 1 Euro for the support. Fine.










2014 Aug 07 – Welcome in Ethiopian reality



The day was hard. Though the plane landed 6am in the morning, I received at my room at 6pm in the evening. This was since Aida car was defect, but anyway she had the drill to welcome me at the airport. So she came to the airport with a taxi, we put my luggage to the hotel reception and then, so her plan, we drive to her car to fetch it and the he will show me some secrets of Addis – she achieved, but not the way as planned.

Since we both had no money even to pay a taxi, I needed to get some Birr first. This was not possible at the hotel, and this was not possible at a banks desk: they had no internet connection – and without Internet connection I cannot receive money at my credit card. After a quarter the banks employee found out that he had not the right software permission to get me the money ... and he showed me the ATM (automated cashpoint) that was positioned in the back office! I received 4.000 Birr / 150 €.

With the taxi we drove to Aidas car. It was parked at the ground of a church pastor in Addis. After he welcomed us it was impossible to leave without having a meal and a welcome tea. He served freshly baked Injera (Ethiopian pita bread made out of teff) with meat. I could not eat that much of it but honored the hospitality. After one hour of meal we than liked to get the car, but the engine didn't start. So we went to the next garage (they said garage to it, I had no courage to

take a photo of what I did see). Picked up a mechanist there and walked back to the defect car. Another hour was gone. The mechanist screwed at the car, but didn't get it run. He suggest to buy some fuel, could be the case that this is empty.

So walk to the garage again, get some empty oil-can to buy petrol, drive with the taxi to a gasoline station and all this back. Next 2 hours were gone. The mechanics did get the car running and so I was happy.

This was too early. The car crashed at the next upward slope within a huge dense smoke. We searched for the next garage, waited, waited, they screw something, they achieved nothing and sent us to some other garage. With 1st gear we drove around Addis, found a garage, but since it was late they told us that they can't do anything today.


Since my nerves meanwhile were blanked, and since all this happened without sleep after leaving Minden, and against hospitality rules I urged Aida to leave that car at that current garage overnight, look for some overnight stay in Addis for her and put me to my hotel now. So she can care for her car the next day. We did it that way.

Arriving at the hotel 6pm I needed to eat something. I chose something secure: Spaghetti Carbonara. I didn't take local rules in account: with a bang the power failed, no lights no cooking possible. The waitress tried to convince me that this is no problem, power will be back in half an hour, then I will get the meal. I comforted me with some bottles of beer meanwhile.

Meanwhile the Global-Care president in Germany (Reinhard Berle) was concerned since he didn't hear anything from me. So I SMSed the story in short. His immediate answer: "Welcome in Ethiopian reality."






























2014 Aug 09 – Felt Strong Fear




So far I got no luck with Ethiopian culture. On Saturday I thought to take some walk at Addis Abeba city. Right after 10m behind the monitored and supervised outer wall of the hotel I get greeted by two Ethiopian students. As they told, there is just holiday at the university and they currently have no jobs and no income. But anyway they are very happy to find such interesting people like me. Mmhh, who didn't love to hear such nice words? After walking a while I noticed that there is no chance for me to get rid of them. The students in turn suggested me to lead me a little bit through the city. Since the city indeed is a strange moloch I agreed.



























































































Indeed they led me good ways through the city, showed and explained me this and that. Saw Addis' automotive spare part market by the way. My guides showed me a nice restaurant for dinner (need not to say here who had to pay). And they guided me through the Addis bus system – it's completely pointless to try to go by bus alone as tourist. Besides the streets have no name, the busses no numbers and no signed destination, besides that, the people are fighting to get into the small busses that there is no chance for foreigners to come into the busses.

Mercato is the biggest market in North-Africa. Every tourist guide suggests to visit this. So my two guides put me to the Mercato too. It's not only a market, it's rather a small city by itself only filled with market stands and houses. My guides led me to corners were I got strange feelings in my stomach area, partly it was really dark and narrow. And they led me from side lane to side lane ... but anyway everything went well so far. They told that they want me to have this experience.

After that they liked to show me a "Bar". They called it the "Addis Facebook" because it would be an exchange place of interesting people that have interesting ideas.

Being in the bar I began to get uncomfortable. It was not wished to take some photos; any way I shot some. They surfed some cabbage, looked like a flower bouquet. They convinced me that this is a medical vegetable which is healthy, partly it is stimulating like coffee. Even this cabbage is exported worldwide as some medical; but it is not approved for Germany that's why I cannot know it.

To fulfill local forms of hospitality it is necessary to eat 3 of these bouquets. After trying some leafs I decided rather to break hospitality rules. Since they put meanwhile also water-pipes in action the bar get that muggly and filled with smoke that I needed to leave the closed room. Doing this I broke hospitality rules a 2nd time.

A good point in time to leave the complete scene at all. My guides accepted this so far, but noted that they need to present me the bill for their services. They told me already that they have no work and no money to pay rent for the flat. The bill comprised the guidance through the city and costs of the bar. I asked what they suggest as adequate amount, I got no answer. I offered 400 Birr (15€, \$21). This is rather a lot according local habits. A complete meal in upper-class restaurants is 150-200 Birr for example. My guides did not agree: ONE bouquet of the cabbage would cost 350 Birr − they consumed seven of them; additionally they ordered tea and bought some packages of cigarettes. Additionally they led through the city, additionally some gift for the flat, since we're Christians this is common.

Sums up to required 2.500 Birr (95€, \$130). I need to pay this since otherwise they are not let out of the bar. The fact that I'm at all had 700 Birr in cash did not irritate them. Even my very clear NO did not help me to get some result. Anyway I gave them 400 Birr, straight went onto the door to leave – but immediately a group of people locked the door and stopped me to go. Just like in a bad Hollywood thriller – unfortunately just reality for me here and now. If I would not have

enough cash-money this wouldn't be a problem: they offered me to guide me to next ATM (money machine) where I can get cash which I can hand them out. Very original and nice idea.

At this point my personal comfort-zone and point of tolerance was uniquely exceeded, I felt very uneasy and felt immediate danger; as in seldom times in my life. Already positioned at the exit-door I aggressively and with force pushed the guys away, unlocked the door (was locked meanwhile) and ran outside as good as I could. One of them followed me, but I run just flailing around me, stopped the very first taxi I saw on the street and jumped into it. That was a safe place.

I still believe in good things in the world, but sometimes it's harder. Lessons I experienced for this location:

- Ignore all people on left and right, ignore all calls of people. Go your way straight forward. This is rather hard, sounds like in-human, but is likely necessary to achieve anything.
- Don't believe any foreigner anything; completely independent what story is told. In their true need the people invent stories we cannot imagine.

2014 Aug 14 – Wine to Water talks



On Thursday we made got progress with the water story http://lift2life.de/water at Bishoftu School. Athin & Paulus from the Doc Hendley Wine-To-Water team visited us at the school area. They already did some explorations and suggested solutions how to dig the well and deploy the water at the school area.

School council (Aida Mohammed) and president of Global-Care were present to discuss requirements. After that Doc Hendley team now is specifying the concrete technical implementation plans as discussed.

The 30/30: Together with Bishoftu School we will present a report, why water is so urgent and vital for the school. This report will help Doc Hendley in turn to gather a part of the money.

Why water is important for the school?

Currently one 500L high tank is utilized to collect municipal water. At one hand this water is delivered by city – sometimes, and sometimes not. Besides that the water has no good quality – it is no drinking water.

At the other hand the school educates cooks (cooking with water) and the school is required to have clean and working sanitary equipment. These issues are controlled by municipal officials too.

So there is great conflict by getting no water and at the same time is checked the official hygiene requirements are full filled. It's told the school will be closed if requirements will not be full filled.

If the closing would occur, 100 young teenagers per year would not get their chance to get a education. All of the teenagers come out of the poorest families which are supported by Global-Care to give their kids a 2nd chance.





















2014 Aug 19 – Started setup LED lightening



This week we started the setup of LED lightening of the Bishoftu school area. The plan is to setup 7 posts with LED lamps at the outer area and additional 10 small LED lamps mounted at the school building. The construction and installation will be executed by staff and pupils of the school.

We started with the school council and the team leads to discuss the activities and the outcomes.





LED lamps are not available in Ethiopia; just Chinese material what nobody wants to have. We bought the lamps already in Germany and took them together with our normal flight-baggage to Ethiopia. Thomas Greth from Audatex DE supported me here with a great job. Material for the posts, fittings and fundament needed to be bought in Ethiopia.









The work started immediately by digging holes for the posts fundament and constructing the posts. It came out that even basic things are not available or do not work:

- Shovel for digging hole. They use some metal for grabbing.
- A saw for cutting the lamp posts and its arming to required length. We used grinding discs which deliver not the required precision but it works as a 80/20.
- Drill machine for drilling holes in the posts. We needed to hire an external resource.

Anyway the young teenagers here are very engaged and have much fun to experience new things, talking about the construction, discuss about alternate detail solutions if problems arise.





















Why overnight lightening is important?

The school owns valuable equipment used for educational purposes. In average the Ethiopian people are rather poor. Especially overnight there is a high rate of criminality. For this the school area is guarded 24h a day by armed guards. Additionally the area needs to lighten fully overnight.

Why LED lamps?

Currently the school area is lighted partly by old fashioned, traditional street lights. Since Ethiopia is at the equator we have 12h day and 12 night every day a year. The power consumption for current street lights consumes 35% of the fiscal household of the school. With the LED there will be a reduction by 90% and having better light at the same time.

Why all this?

It's all about education of next generation. Bishoftu School originally implements this, Solealnc.com supports this.



Today at Bishoftu School we had a marriage: The posts set up last week met the first two LED lamps from Germany.



Michael Mahler from AUTOonline is here the strong 20 – in reality the 80. He signed to design and implement solutions and we had productive conversation about the options.














2014 Sep 06 – Short break here in Ethiopia


2014 Sep 09 – Finished short break from Ethiopia

2014 Sep 18 – Wine to Water did a great move




Today we had a hot summer day in Addis Abeba – and we did a great step forward in the Water-to-Wine story for the Bishoftu School in Ethiopia. After times with technical and organizational exchange of issues today we signed the first contract for digging the well.

"Water to Wine" is an American charitative Org which cares for water in Africa. In Ethiopia it is represented by "Selam Awassa Water Drilling Works and Sanitation". The special note here is, that "Selam" is a commercial company – but charitative activities are executed with 0% margin. And this in turn is supported and controlled by Water-to-Wine.

With the well in place 100 trainees at Bishoftu School can get fresh ground water. Currently there is no water at all or water provided by a tank which is not drinkable.





2014 Sep 26 – Green light for digging the well




This week we got final green light from <u>Wine-To-Water</u> for start digging the well at Bishoftu School. Wine-To-Water sponsored a honorable, so far missing amount of money to support Soleras Lift2Life project in Ethiopia.

The digging can now be prepared to start within the next 2 weeks. It will be executed by http://www.selamawassa.org

2014 Oct 02 – Primary school Lift2Life support in Ethiopia



Besides the projects Water, Electricity and Internet I planned to care for a primary school in Bishoftu. This is a long running project (at least 5 years) but it needs to be initiated. This week I did some workouts:

The project is about building a primary school in Bischoftu / Ethiopia. The building needs to be newly built and equipped with educational interior. It is planned to have about 500 – 800 children in the age from 6 to 14 in the starting period. There is a great demand for private schools since governmental institutions cannot fulfil the demand. If the project is well prepared the "German Federal Ministry for Economic Cooperation and

Development" http://www.bmz.de sponsors up to 75% of the overall cost.

The primary school needs to have two stages:

- 1. Class 1-4: basic education (reading, writing, arithmetic)
- 2. Class 5-8: extended education with all basic sciences (detailed below)

Target groups:

- Sponsored children of Global-Care in the age from 6-14
- 300-500 additional children in the age from 6-14

Project targets are:

- 1. Provide a good quality primary school for sponsored children. By this, saving thousands of Dollars school fee for foreign schools.
- 2. Provide a good quality primary school for children in need. There is fee planned.
- 3. The income-amounts are required to finance the vocational school. The vocational school is driven completely by donations; it is complete cost-free for attendees. Only teenagers that have otherwise no chance to get an education attend it.

Attached are some pictures of the targeted sponsored children, mostly shot at their home environment.






















2014 Oct 03 – German Unity Day at Embassy Addis Abeba



The German Unity Day is an important holiday for Germany: the re-union of West and East in 1989. This date finalized the cold war of Eastern and Western countries worldwide.

German ambassador in Ethiopia (Joachim Schmidt) invited Germans living in Ethiopia http://www.addis-abeba.diplo.de. So this was an event to have many talks with different people with different professions and interests: priests, foreign embassy staff, European commission staff, lots other charitative organizations.

For the Lift2Life at Ethiopia I could achieve contact to "Ethio – German Development Cooperation" (GIZ). They support implementation of German projects in Ethiopia. This will be helpful to get support at my "primary school" initiation in Bishoftu. Among others GIZ cares in Ethiopia for

- labor market-oriented education
- sustainable land management
- national quality infrastructure
- energy coordination

In summary this was a useful social event with couple of small talks, but also getting contacts which might be helpful in future.

























2014 Oct 07 – Solar Subproject stopped



Regarding the Solar-Subproject we found out that solar-electricity is no option for Bishoftu School. Lastly we decided to stop this completely, giving the 80 into success tasks. This result is the outcome of 6 weeks research at the mission place.

To get this proved I had discussion with 2 Solar-Companies at the school area, exchange with <u>solar-energy-foundation.org</u>, deep look at the energy records of the school and discussions with Global-Care (driver of the school). Main issues are:

- **Solar panels** that are available here are about 6 times more expansive than expected; even they are hard to get at all.
- **Energy cost** and governmental energy politic: school pays max 600 Birr (\$32) per month for electricity. And, this is mainly the pure connection to the grid (having governmental electricity). There are very low costs for volume of usage. Electricity is subsidized enourmosly since it is regarded as base ressource.
 - => With Solarpanels not one cent gets saved. The school just get additional cost for maintenance.
 - => At no time amortization takes place
- **The true issue** here is not saving energy; rather it is having energy at all. Namely coping with daily failing of it is a problem to get the school running. Accumulators were discussed that get charged by the grid. Anyway this is "green thinking" of the rich part of the world. The most practical and commonly used solution here is a Diesel-Generator.

The good things we achieved

- We found this out before putting money to foreign companies.
- I got a note from Global-Care that they are thankful for caring that deep direct at the location and preventing wrong investments

Interesting for Ethiopia

According my talks with the Solar Energy Foundation there is indeed one scenario where solar energy is applied in Ethiopia: These are governmental driven properties like schools or hospitals in area without any grid the next years. There Solar is an alternative to Diesel.













2014 Aug 08 – Ethiopian Magazines



Initiated publication of Solera Lift2Life stories in Ethiopian magazines. In contact with two magazines published in Addis Abeba: Ethiopian Business Review (EBR) and Echo Africa.

Chief Executive Editor of EBR already replied that the magazine due to policy reasons cannot report about single companies or single projects. They only report about mainstreams, markets in

general or issues that matters main sectors. So I'm now working on a contact of one of their authors: Management Director of Ethiopian Insurance Corporation.

Seeing forward now regarding Echo Africa to achieve some publication there.

In Ethiopia there is no developed newspaper and magazine market. At my mission place – Bishoftu – there is no newspaper available at all. In Addis Abeba there are some shops you can buy international newspapers. The above magazines are the ones you get on selected locations. And even: none of any of the magazine has a *working* internet presence.

2014 Oct 12 – Bishoftu School Business Plan



This week I worked out a draft of a business plan for the vocational school here in Bishoftu. The subject is, that the school currently is financed 100% by donations raised in Germany (Global-Care). In a midterm it is necessary and meaningful that the school is able to generate own

income. The income will be used to help financing the vocational school itself, but also the planned primary school project.

As business and solution requirements we worked out:

- Generate a stable, year by year increasing income
- Participate trainees of the existing vocational school
- Attract the area of the school
- The solution needs to be initiated fast with low initial requirements and low initial cost
- The solution needs to be start with existing equipment and minimal additional staff

Two business ideas including schedules for timetable, marketing, fiscal and risk analysis were drafted.

Idea 1: Cooking & Hotel

Provide a dinner meal for the public at the existing school location. Cooking trainees prepare the meal by supervising of the trainers. Hotel education trainees serve the meal by supervising of the trainers. There are two fixed types of meals served per day:

- 1. A fast food meal at low price (e.g. sandwich)
- 2. A complete menu including opener, main dish and dessert at medium price.

Guest can only choose between these two options. The type of meals change every day. To have a win-win for guests and trainees the offerings have the goal to be above-average quality. This regards to the meals itself, but also to the environment and serving service. The service will be provided from 12:00 to 14:00 only.

Idea 2: Construction

Construction department works primarily with concrete, stone material and iron. The idea is that the trainees produce different bricks and tools that are required for building houses or similar constructions (gates, roads, gardens). The easiest ramp-up is to build bricks and sell them.

Mostly all machinery is existent and used for educational purposes. There are even already bricks produced and stored at the area, but they are not sold due to legal issues.

Since well-educated trainers and above average machinery exists, the business has an advantage compared to similar offers at the market. The goal is to produce above average quality at low cost. There are two phases planned.

Phase 1: start with the existing equipment. Everything is present to start immediately. Phase 2: produce different kind of blocks, different sizes and shapes. Do more than other providers in this area do.

2014 Oct 13 - Car for Bishoftu School



This is a story about uncommonness of Ethiopian economy.

For the Lift2Life mission we originally planned to utilize a rental car when some travel or transport is necessary. We assumed \$1.000 for this per month. After calculation we came to the idea not to rent a car, but rather buy a cheap, used car and sell that car after mission end. This will save money. There was another approach: not selling the car, but spending the car after mission end to Bishoftu School.

The story took a completely other path. First to say is, that there are no rental cars in Ethiopia available at all. It is possible to get a car, but only with driver. There is no company that give you a car for driving it by yourself.

So we looked for used cars. Any used car driving in Ethiopia is imported from Asia or Europe. The transport of the used cars is via ship, and then by truck from Djibouti to Ethiopia. In addition to the car cost, this adds transport cost, on top of this government raises import tax of about 100%. (This is to stimulate Ethiopian industry, but there is none).

What we found: a Toyota RAV4, built 2005, mileage above 100.000km; imported from Belgium, there was still the "B" at the rear. Cost: 32.000€, not joking.

Really in the same week the existing car of the school wrecked ultimately; the school needed another car. So some serious question arose: for me how to travel, and for the school where to get a car from.

Lastly we did in that way, that we took the Solera Lift2Life amount scheduled for the rental car, plus some extra and donated it to Global-Care organization. So this was a base for buying the Toyota for the school. In the result I had no car at all. We arranged that we share the school car now as best as possible.



2014 Oct 18 – Electricity for Well Rework



Regarding the well we have a delay. There is a new governmental issue which will hopefully resolved on coming Monday. Another issue is the concrete electrical installation and integration of the well-pump into the existing electrical circuit of the school.

In Ethiopia it is about every meter of cable, every screw, every dig. They look rather hard about every Cent, even if it is written there is discussion. If something is not written and explicitly clarified you will run in trouble for sure. Having this in combination with African culture and habits makes the things not easy to solve.

For today I succeeded with reply of the well company: "OK, you won". Digging will start coming Monday.

Currently my wife stays here with me in Ethiopia. We planned a 5-day outage to visit some place in the country. Currently it looks like we need to cancel this due to the delay – digging will overlap with my wife's stay here. This is 90/10: take 90 percent ownership.

We supported them with small tasks, showed our interest for their future, they told us about their expectation for the exam and about their future. They take their chance and dig into life.


















2014 Oct 23 – Expose Lift2Life in Bishoftu



2014 Oct 24 – Well Drilling Day by Day



Drilling now last on the whole week. We are at 32m depth. Look at the picture: every 2 meters the driller take a sample from the ground. By this system you see the depth and the type of material you have at this depth. Currently the last 16 meters were pure rock, so it goes on at unhurried speed. Let's see how this goes on.



2014 Oct 27 – Something unexpected happened



Ethiopians have another working culture, other working habits than we are used to. Telling a little bit exaggerated in this post, I experienced so far: If you want something done, then you have to ask for it, then again the next day, then again the next week. After this they start to explain why this or that does *not* work. So you turnover again.

The LED lightening of the area is not finished at some places, since the pump of the well needs to be included into the electrical circuit. Some temporary solution is required. I discussed the issue with the people here at the school last week.

The surprise for me: This Monday morning I looked out of my window and just noticed that workers setup the temporary lightening solution on own initiative. Without any further reminder or question. So I had a new experience this day.













2014 Aug 28 – Slow Advance Today

2014 Oct 30 – Visit Family of Yoredanose



Today we visited the family of Yoredanose. The family is one of the poor ones in Bishoftu, so they even get the housing supported from the government.

The father of Yoredanose is a daily worker, that is, every morning he goes out of the house and looks for some work at the near market every day. The mother now and then cooks for foreign people.

There are 5 children of age 10, 15, 19, 20, 25 to care for. Yoredanose (19) got the chance for an educational place at the vocational school of Global-Care in Bishoftu. She just now finished the one year cooking course, she achieved "Level 1" and is now preparing the advanced "Level 2". Due to sponsorship of Global-Care the education is free of cost for the ones in need.

Within her education Yoredanose got the great chance to complete a hands-on training at http://liesakresort.com which is a famous and fine address here in Ethiopia. Since she passed all the tasks she has a very good chance to get a permanent job at the Liesak Resort.

We were impressed how the family stays together, helping each other and sharing the complete income. The family is very proud of Yoredanose. And we in turn are proud to supply help for self-help within the #Lift2Life project.




















2014 Nov 07 – Few Days Off in Ethiopia










2014 Nov 10 – Water at Bischoftu School found!



The drilling of the well has finished! As expected first water was found at about 65m. Selam Awassa stopped the drilling at 77m depth after 6 days. Plenty and clean water sprung out – that was a great pleasure! See the attached video snippet.


Now we wait again: the water samples are in a governmental laboratory for checking the quality. If the water is drinkable we receive a certificate stating this. Only in that case we can supply it to the school. The next steps then will be to arrange power supply and setup a pipeline to the water tank. All this will be done manually – there is no usual machinery here.

If the water will not be drinkable we need to change the plan. So wish us the best!

Besides the video here is a nice view at the progress. During drilling every 2 meter a sample of the ground is collected in a box. As a result you see the 77m and the geological profile at the school area.







2014 Nov 11 - Internet



Coming week Michael Mahler from AUTOonline will arrive to setup Internet facilities for the vocational school in Bishoftu / Ethiopia. So far I heard this and that what he has planned, but I don't know details. So I'm pretty much curious and looking forward what will come. Great contribution!

I have a fear: The Internet connection from the city does not work for 2 weeks now. It is rather common here, that something basic is mis-functioning always: electricity, water, telephone or internet. If the primary Internet-Input does not work at all up to next week then it will be hard for Michael to achieve meaningful results.

So let's see and wish us the best again!

Internet availability here in Ethiopia is still rather seldom and uncommon. Normal people (95%) have no Internet access; there is no "culture" for E-Mailing or simply retrieving information for anything. At the other hand it is known that Internet access and knowledge is a important key for future development.

As you might know Mark Zuckerberg is about to provide Internet connectivity for disadvantaged regions. Maybe this is an option for central Africa too in near future.

I'm convinced that our #Lift2Life efforts will provide a significant contribution for the school and the young pupils getting education here.

2014 Nov 12 – Things usually not talked about



The last 10 days I got serious trouble to receive cash money.

Here in Ethiopia everything is other than normally known or expected. I'm used to get money with my MasterCard all over the world. This is not true for Ethiopia. At banks they cannot handle credit cards in general. The newest progress here is the setup of ATMs, a couple of them accepting Master and Visa. But the ATMs need:

- 1. electricity
- 2. network connection

It is a rather seldom occasion that both requirements are full filled at the same time. The last week even all the banks here in Bishoftu could not work at all because even the business network connection was not functional.

Not worth to say, that ONLY cash money is accepted at any location and from any person. And this is the problem: Everywhere cash is expected, but banks are not able to deliver it.

My luck today: After digging around over 1 week I found an ATM which was able to hand me out 150€. After that the ATM decided that this is enough for me.

Problem is, that this is even true for the #Lift2life project money. This is Africa: you need to look for unconventional solutions every day.









2014 Nov 15 – Genesis Farm Involvement





These days I tried 3 times to get an appointment with the manager of the local "Genesis Farm" direct at his office. Genesis Farm is a Dutch agricultural company which is one of the largest provider of jobs for local people (besides military). Our aim is to involve Genesis Farm in the #Lift2Life story by supporting the vocational school in Bishoftu.

There are not much companies here in Bishoftu. Even there are not much companies in Ethiopia at all: 2.600 manufacturing enterprises exists in whole Ethiopia. This about the amount of manufacturers a medium sized city in Europe has. In consequence there is a significant foreign trade deficit: Export is 3 Billion USD, Import is above 30 Billion USD.

Anyway, I try our luck here with the agricultural Genesis farm. 3 times I had no luck, next week – next trial.











2014 Nov 17 – Internet sponsored by AUTOonline



This week Michael Mahler from AUTOonline received here in Bishoftu. Besides the travelling costs <u>AUTOonline</u> sponsored the Lift2Life with Internet connection equipment for the vocational school. This is a couple of Powerline adapters, routers, a modern Fritz DSL box and accompanied by lots of cables and setup material.

This first day we got an overview about existing infrastructure, hardware and the school buildings at all. We found out different options for the implementation – so the chances are good to succeed.

One issue is the internet availability as provided by the Ethiopian Telekom. Partly there are several weeks where no Internet at all is available. This is currently the case. So our only chance is to go after the Telekom and ask them for caring. With some luck it will work these days.

We thank <u>AUTOonline</u> for that great support. Internet availability will significantly enhance the prospects of the school, its trainers and in effect the students.

At the pictures you see that all this is done by true handcraft.

I got a lot of feedbacks that the well is the most valuable, most useful and most sustainable task we did. I slowly learned the value by myself: if there is no water you cannot wash yourself, you cannot wash anything, toilets do not work. This is odd if you experience that by yourself.

We have to say THANK YOU especially to "<u>Selam Awassa Water Drilling Works and Sanitation plc</u>,, namely Atkelt and Paulos. It came out that doing this work in Ethiopia is a struggle every day from new – the unexpected happens every day. Selam Awassa managed it. Last not least at the end of the day there turned a gap of the planned money. Selam Awassa anyway did their work to the originally proposed amount. So they additionally SPONSORED the vocational school in Bishoftu within our Lift2Life mission.

2015 Jan 24 – Care for Lift2Life Sustainability



Lots of achievements happened this week in our Lift2Life project in Ethiopia.

Solera runs its mission in Ethiopia in cooperation with Global-Care. I'm here in Bishoftu again together with heads of Global-Care to discuss how to actually and effectively achieve sustainment for the coming years. This is challenging – but the original task at all: the story here is about the teenagers in need. To emphasize and strengthen our interest, the Lift2Life operational Lead Jan van der Waart came to Ethiopia too. We had a couple meetings and smalltalks. Some of the outcomes end of this week:

- The vocational school need to initiate a business to achieve additional income generation. For this a business plan is required. We acknowledged to support Global-Care in this subject.
- To get a business running a network is required. We arranged a meeting with a similar organization in Addis Abeba: "Selam Awassa Children Village". We arranged an initial meeting with the Managing Director Zenebe Tesfaye. Primary questions was, whether and how Mr.Tesfaye can support this work in Ethiopia.
- We arranged a follow-up workshop with the "Selam Children Village" on coming Tuesday. The aim is to settle up concrete steps and milestones to initiate all of the plans. This includes organizational changes. The target is to have the first step of a business running within one year meaning end of 2015. Everything starts small, do the first step.
- To find a business we utilize the idea of "Quick Wins": look what we have, look what is present and make a business out of it.
- Currently the vocational school is financed 100% by German donations. The long-term goal is, that the school generates all its fiscal requirements by itself.









2015 Jan 27 – Cornerstones for future of Bishoftu school



Today we did a good step forward to sustain the work of the Bishoftu vocational school. This turns out as a good step to sustain our Lift2Life efforts of Solera. We visited the Management of Selam-Children-Village. This is a charitative organization in Addis Abeba doing nearly the same work as Global-Care in Bishoftu. The ultimate difference: Selam-Children runs an own business generating own income! This is the target Global-Care needs to reach in Bishoftu.

With Selam-Children-Village we believe to have a strong and good partner within Ethiopia. We had meetings and talks with

- change the organization structure of Bishoftu school to be allowed to run a business
- provide a working business plan
- find trustworthy network in Ethiopia to run a business
- raise additional money for initiating a business

All this is for the children in need. They are the cornerstone of our interest and efforts.

- drive the long term plan for setting up a primary school


We talked about how Solera could accompany and support this process. Our Lift2Life effort will continue – to give a 2nd chance the children in need.
